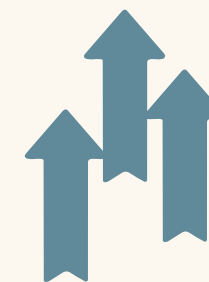

Strong movements are built by leaders who are prepared to guide the way forward. The Foundation's Credit Union Development Education (commonly known as DE) program continues to cultivate credit union professionals who are committed to advancing financial well-being in their communities. Through immersive learning experiences, participants deepen their understanding of the credit union philosophy and return to their organizations ready to lead with purpose.

Developing the leaders of the movement

In 2025, 248 new Development Educators joined this growing network of leaders from across the movement. These leaders are not only shaping the future of their credit unions and organizations but also helping the entire system move forward.

At the same time, through Workshops and other presentations, 2,008 credit union professionals participated in experiences designed to connect individuals to the broader mission of the credit union movement, helping leaders at every level better understand the impact of their work.

Next year, we will expand space, introduce additional classes, and build more life-changing cohorts, allowing more credit union professionals to access transformative experiences that fuel system-wide innovation and long-term impact.

Through our grant programs, the Foundation continues to support credit unions as they explore innovative approaches to improving financial well-being. These investments help bring new solutions to life, meeting people where they are, and addressing real challenges in meaningful ways.

408

savings accounts opened at credit unions through our foster youth grant initiatives, resulting in \$22,449.31 in savings accumulated.



GRANTS

Fueling innovation and impact

In 2025, grant-supported initiatives focused on expanding financial education and strengthening community partnerships to reach youth transitioning out of foster care. Across the country, credit unions partnered with local nonprofits, schools, and foster care organizations to deliver hands-on financial education, create pathways to safe and accessible banking, and build long-term support systems for young people navigating financial independence.

Programs ranged from integrating financial education into transitional living and workforce programs, to redesigning account access for youth without traditional identification, to launching new savings incentives that built early financial habits. In some communities, credit unions expanded their reach through digital tools, while others focused on deep, local engagement by embedding financial education directly into the environments where the impacted youth live and learn.

Each recipient’s initiative represents a step forward in testing ideas, learning what works, and building pathways that others across the movement can follow. In one instance, a participant was able to apply what she learned and access the right support to avoid losing her home—demonstrating how financial education can translate into real stability when it matters most.

“This grant was like a safety net under one of those high lines they walk on at the circus. It gave us the confidence to try something we would have been too skittish to attempt (and invest in) otherwise. At our size, every dollar matters. This grant was a breath of fresh air and permission to return to self in a way to reconnect with our deeper identity and the altruistic foundational beliefs we were born from. What a gift. As new grant cohorts begin, more credit unions will have the opportunity to build on these insights, test ideas, refine their approaches, and create lasting change.

When a credit union is hit with a disaster, the movement shows up. Through the Foundation's CUAid disaster relief program, credit unions, credit union employees, and volunteers affected by natural disasters receive direct financial support to help them recover and rebuild. In these moments of crisis, the strength of the movement is most visible.

Responding when our own community is in need

In close partnership with state Leagues and League foundations, the Foundation raises and manages funds that are directed to those in need. The National Foundation and/or the League or League foundation in the area work to identify needs within their communities and connect the support directly to credit union employees and volunteers.

Every dollar donated to CUAid goes directly to those impacted, helping credit unions, individuals, and families recover, rebuild, and move forward. This work reflects the credit union difference in its purest form: people helping people, especially when the road ahead is at its most challenging.

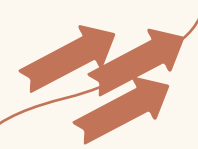

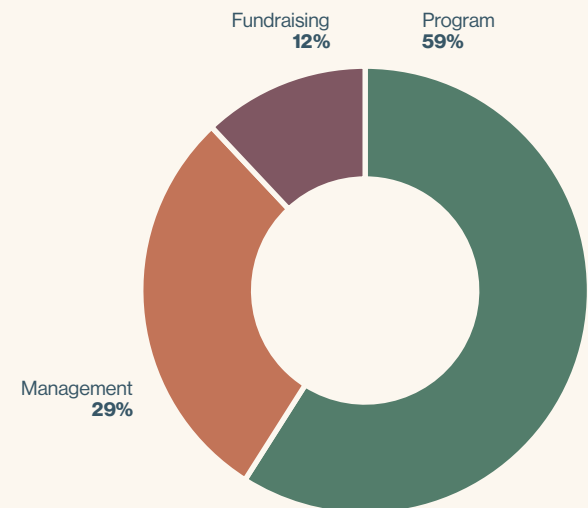
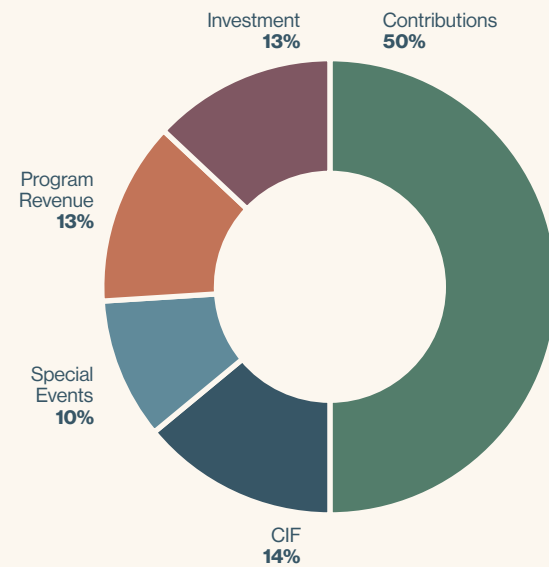
